Introductory Beginner's Workshop May 1st, 2013


The Botanica 2013 exhibition generated considerable interest in a beginner's workshop. The first of these will be held on:

Gordon Harris Demonstration - Friday April 5th, 2013

At a Wednesday BASNZ meeting in late 2012, Rebecca Brown-Thompson gave a demonstration on painting in acrylic. Bits and Bobs

NZ Post New Zealand Native Ferns

Perhaps you too have admired the stunning February 2013 New Zealand Native Ferns stamp issue! Members at our weekly meeting at Mona Vale were full of admiration and wondered who was responsible and so with a little bit of detective work, we discovered the following....

The presentation pack was written by Patrick Brownsey, a Research Fellow at the Museum of New Zealand Te Papa Tongarewa in Wellington. He is co-author of *New Zealand Ferns and Allied Plants* and has published more than 100 scientific works on New Zealand, Australian and Pacific ferns.

The artwork was created by 2di4 Design in Wellington, the business of Di and artist/illustrator husband Stephen Fuller. Di kindly responded to our enquiry about the stamps and how they were created, saying the following......

"The illustrations; the black and white renders are 'digital' pencil. The colored pictures are 'digital' oils. They were done at a very large size, for example the coloured ferns were done at A2 size (594mm x 420 mm) so we could get all the detail. When I say 'digital' my husband, Stephen draws straight into the computer with a pen and tablet (rather than a mouse), and he uses a computer program that replicates different painting and drawing medias. He is a traditionally trained illustrator and artist, but in today's world, the good old traditional piece of art isn't used any longer in the commercial world, and digital it has become."

On being asked about the importance or relevance of traditional art training and in particular the place of botanical art in the modern digital world, Di replied...

"Stephen totally is reliant on his traditional training and skills, that is what makes him exceptional at what he does, because he has that traditional training and understanding of using traditional medias. I call him 'old school', because he comes from a family who are artists, sculptors, potters etc, so very much has the traditional grounding unlike a lot of illustrators coming through now. But for commercial work of this kind, all sketches and thinking are sketched straight to computer. We do have paper in the office, and often sketch ideas for ideas based jobs, but with this one, paper wasn't required :-) We are great fans of traditional artwork, and that kind of work will never die, and we enjoy producing paintings in our free time and exhibit. Commercially, it just isn't viable now-a-days in the industry we are in. So for botanical artist, there is a place for their work, just more so now in a gallery."

Di and her husband Stephen work with a variety of businesses here in New Zealand and abroad, including design and advertising agencies.
